This small outbuilding was probably built as a milk house. The fieldstone construction would have allowed the milk to remain cool is warm temperatures.

#### HISTORICAL ASSOCIATION

This building is associated with a farm occupied by J. McKnight in 1879.

### CONTEXT/COMMENTS

The building retains its heritage character, but many of the associated farm buildings have been removed and the associated farmhouse is in disrepair. It is the only milk house recorded during the field study.

This farm is associated with the Nixon family. The land was originally settled by John Nixon, who received the deed from the Crown in 1860.

### CONTEXT/COMMENTS

This is a well-preserved example of a confederation period barn. The situation and heritage character of this building is intact.

### STYLE/DESIGN/PHYSICAL CHARACTERISTICS

This structure is a large gable barn. Its present configuration was built in at least three phases, being the eastern portion, identifiable by the foundation formed by large, dressed fieldstones, the middle portion, identifiable by the rubblestone foundation, and the westernmost section, identifiable by the concrete foundation. The earliest section is likely that with the rubblestone foundation.

#### HISTORICAL ASSOCIATION

Thomas Garvey received this land in 1849. From Ireland, he was one of an enclave of Irish Catholics who settled near what became Kingsbridge. The Garvey farm had been in the same family for more than a century.

### **CONTEXT/COMMENTS**

In spite of some later additions and modifications to this barn, it retains its heritage character and is associated with a nineteenth-century house that is part of the the existing farm (H19).
